Class Projects DOGANA: The Dynamic and Vibrant Group of People as Ever

The Dow Alumni community is the most unique among the Pakistani institutions as it gives the same sense of alumni camaraderie that is visible and felt in United States Institutions. From the early days of Dow Graduate Association in Pakistan, the Dow alumni community is thriving in all corners of the globe. In United States from the humble small gathering in 1983 to become the largest alumni association of APPNA is the story that speaks volumes. From the Dow Alumni Website in 1993 being the first ever website of any Pakistani institution to the most comprehensive presence on Internet and Social media, the Dowites are keeping the tradition of social and political activism alive.

DOGANA since 2004 has had many milestones. It became the largest alumni association within APPNA with total membership of DOGANA reaching 850 and APPNA membership reaching varying between 650-750. It has played ever increasing role in shaping APPNA activities. It has worked side by side with other alumni to bring Social Forums to the forefront of APPNA summer conventions. DOGANA set the trend to become the first alumni to establish electronic balloting for election.

This article briefly highlights DOGANA's most notable accomplishment, its silver jubilee class projects of "Giving Back to Dow" and the list of Office bearers of DOGANA since its inception.

The Tradition of 'Giving Back to Alma Mater"

The Dow Class of 1976, on their 25th anniversary, embarked on a mission of fund raising with the sole purpose of "Giving back to Dow" and its patients. Teams of dedicated Dowites were established in North America and in Pakistan. This class project, served as a model for the subsequent classes to follow and ever since every class of Dow on its Silver Jubilee graduation anniversary has given back to Dow and Civil Hospital, a self-sustaining project with the sole purpose of helping the poor patients getting the best care at the Dow and CHK, Karachi. The Dow Endowment Fund, The enDOW

In addition to the silver jubilee projects, the Dow alumni community established a very comprehensive endowment fund for Dow Medical College and Civil Hospital Karachi. The core mission is to establish an ongoing giving with sustainable support to the alma matar. Dow alumni have been very generous in this and now it is fully functioning independent 501c entity where all alumni contribute on a regular basis.

The Tradition of Innovations and Pioneering Spirit in Dow Alumni

The Dow Alumni community has been in the forefront of many innovations and pioneering project. The first to establish the Internet presence in 1993. The first to establish the annual alumni retreat in the spring of 2005. The first ever APPNA Presidential Debate was organized by DOGANA in 2012. The Loan Program (need based) was established for Dow graduates appearing in USMLE. The Merit Scholarship for the final year students and the Research Scholarship for the medical students are some of the projects recently started by DOGANA.

Canadians for Global Care

Inspired by the Midland Doctors in UK, I founded Canadians for Global Care in 2009 with like minded people in Canada. The purpose of the organization is to support health related projects locally and globally. Our vision is better health for all and our mission is to achieve this goal by creating health awareness through education.

We have held multiple fundraising events in all major cities of Canada to support Midland Doctors in their mega project of building an earthquake proof hospital in Muzzafarabad. I have visited the site multiple times to review progress of the construction. The hospital opened its doors to patients in 2012, our team of Physicians is visiting the hospital in march to do workshops and clinics. We have partnered within our communities to support the Breast cancer foundation.

We have supported the Alberta Childrens hospital in the creation of the Doreen Sensory Room. The equipment in this room is to help children who have sensory perception differences. We have a youth club that is mentored by our team of executives. We hope to leave a legacy of purposeful living for our youth!





The Children Cancer Hospital (CCH)

The Children Cancer Hospital (CCH), a project of Children Cancer Foundation started with very modest means but clear vision in March 2001. This is a premier facility exclusively dedicated to the care of children suffering from cancer. Over the years it has developed into a comprehensive childhood cancer center that provides specialized, advanced pediatric cancer care round the clock Free of Cost.

In 2014, management of Children Cancer Foundation and Indus Hospital joined hand together and Children Cancer Hospital got merged with the The Indus Hospital (TIH). Currently we are working at the same premises but the facility is functioning as an outreach campus of TIH.


The current facility has 45 beds in-patient with High dependency and intensive care unit, 14 bed daycare, 3 bed Emergency and out-patient clinics. It has strong support services including pharmacy, diagnostics, electronic medical record (EMR), Psycho-social and nutrition department. The hospital is committed to strong academic programs with fellowship in pediatric oncology, a nursing education and research department.

One of the unique features of CCH is total care of every child. Our philosophy is to provide the best available treatment to every child whether it is at CCH or needed from outside. The patients are referred to the leading experts of the most reputable hospitals in the city for the services like surgery, radiotherapy and diagnostics which currently do not exist at our hospital. Our Social Services Department takes care of all logistics and payment and patient does not have to take any burden.


CCH began with one pediatric oncologist and two medical officers. Presently we have a dedicated team of doctors with 3 pediatric oncologists, 1 hematologist, 2 pediatricians, 4 oncology fellows, 8 senior medical officers, and 10 medical officers. There is a strong visiting faculty both local and overseas helping ICCH in patient care and academic activities. We have collaboration with faculties of St Judes Research Hospital and Mayo Clinic, USA and Hospital for Sick kids Toronto, Canada and Sidra Medical Center, Qatar. There is an intensive academic activities combined with local center and web based meetings with overseas centers and colleagues on almost weekly basis. We follow standard treatment protocols and almost every child go through tumor board discussion. We have started developing subspecialties like Leukemia, Lymphoma, Sarcoma and Neuro=oncology.

ICCH is one of the largest childhood cancer centers in Pakistan and in the region. We cater patient from all over Pakistan and Afghanistan. More than 50% children come from outside Karachi mainly from interior Sindh and Baluchistan. We see all types of cancer in children up to 16 years of age. The annual number of new cases has been increasing every year. So far we are not refusing any treatable patients. Even the children who are not

curable we do not abandon them and provide supportive care to every child.

Department of Psycho Oncology and Child Life Services

This is first of its kind in Pakistan. The department has achieved remarkable mile stones and played vital role in improving rehabilitation of pediatric cancer patients since its inception. Its accomplishments include:

- Training nurses from all over Pakistan in person centered counseling, cognitive behavior therapy, psycho oncology, grief counseling, needs of hospitalized children and psychological care of children throughout the treatment continuum.
- 2. The department branched out into a more structured service format including rehabilitation services providing academic and exercise routines for children who were away from school during their treatment.
- Complimentary alternative therapy (Reiki, Sound, Touch and Massage Therapy) was included, providing pain management especially in Palliative Care and End of Life.

Department of Medical Education

With the help of My Child Matter Grant, CCH has established Pediatric Oncology Nursing Education Department, first of its kind in Pakistan doing training courses for nurses and doctors. This has helped us tremendously for capacity building of oncology nurses in Pakistan. Our efforts in this field are now internationally recognized and we are also training nurses of Ethiopia. We have been organizing (i) Two week nursing course (ii) One year Nurse Technician course affiliated with Sindh Faculty Board and (iii) one year Pediatric Oncology Nursing Diploma. recognized with Pakistan Nursing Council.

Research

ICCH is actively involved in various research projects. We publish and present our data and experience both nationally and internationally. With collaboration of Indus Research Center various ongoing research projects are in progress both on clinical and basic sciences.

Childhood Cancer Awareness

Childhood Cancer Awareness is one of the major objectives of ICCH. We use both print and electronic media for advocacy and awareness of childhood cancer. We publish educational material for parents and general public to educate them about childhood cancer.

Future Direction

ICCH has become an icon of childhood cancer care in Pakistan. We are striving to make it a Center of Excellence in the region. Our mission is to improve childhood cancer care all over country and develop more Pediatric Oncology centers in Pakistan with the help of Indus Health Network.

Dr. Abdul Bari Khan , a Cardiothoracic Surgeon could have made a successful career in any first world country. However he consciously opted to become a philanthropist with his base in a city in which he grew up.

Although his family hails from Peshawar, he was born and educated in Karachi. He earned his M.B.B.S. from DOW Medical College in 1986 and obtained the coveted post in Cardiac Surgery from College of Physicians & Surgeons Pakistan in 1995. He was appointed Assistant Professor Cardiac Surgery in the year 1999 at Civil Hospital Karachi, which is attached to his alma mater.

Dr. Abdul Bari Khan has been a leader in community services from his early student life. His projects have been focused towards helping the poor and needy. Even before he entered Medical College he was awarded "Best Social Worker Gold Medal", by Adamjee Science College. As a medical student in Dow Medical College he did something unique by establishing a voluntary Blood Bank, which provided healthy screened Blood to patients on exchange basis. The "Patients' Welfare Association" (PWA) today, is one of the largest blood banks in the country.

Two more outlets were established with his lead contribution at Civil Hospital Karachi. One is the Accident & Emergency Unit which was constructed with donation of school children while the second is the Cardiac Surgery Unit which was supported by philanthropists. Till date the later has served more than 5000 thousand patients with life saving surgeries at no cost to them.

Beyond Civil Hospital Karachi Dr. Abdul Bari is entrusted by the Rufaydah Foundation[®] as its Chief Executive, for establishing The Indus Hospital located in the populous district of Korangi Karachi. Presently this is a tertiary care health facility with 150 beds providing free of cost services, including general, cardiac and orthopedic surgery. The venture is set for expansion to a 1500 beds state of the art facility which will also include a University and Research Center.

Surgeon Abdul Bari, apart from his professional responsibilities of a surgeon is a known social activist devoted for the promotion of medical facilities and services in the country. His advice and services are sought by Government and NGOs. He also supports Alumni Projects for Development of Civil Hospital Karachi, associated with his alma mater Dow Medical College.



About three years ago on a visit to the Koohi Goth Women's Hospital in Deh Landhi, Karachi we were left with a lot of admiration for the splendid work that a fellow Dowite Dr. Sher Shah Syed was doing. Women from a wide region of Sindh and beyond come to this center with obstetrical injuries and fistulas and find help in the way of free repair surgery and subsequent rehabilitation. But most importantly, nurses and technicians get trained in the surgical procedures, wound care and social adjustment for these ostracized women.

During discussions we learned that there was not many facilities in Karachi which cared for elderly and terminal patients. Families, that themselves barely survive, and get hit with an family member in pain and agony and limited days to live find themselves unable to take care of him/her. There is a risk of such a person dying early of neglect and abandonment. Also we learned that there was a serious lack, in fact absence of trained medical providers in this field.

Looking around the campus of Koohi Goth Hospital we found there was a lot of open land still available and Dr. Sher Shah and his team quickly grasped the idea that they could easily accommodate a new building with patient beds and other facilities next to the existing hospital. We agreed to participate in this important project leaving the details for Dr. Sher Shah to work out. Engineering plans were quickly drawn up and funds were sent through the cooperation of two other illustrious Dowites Dr. Naseem Shekani and Dr. Tanveer Imam and their organization National Health Forum. Within a matter of a year and a half a one story building was completed and is ready to start admitting patients. As of February 2016 patients are being seen in the outpatient area to help in pain management and other services. Plans are to admit 16 patient initially and to expand the facility to a second floor as needed.


Funds are also being donated by others to help and in December 2015 APPNA Social Services committee kindly donated \$5000 to the project. Suleman Palliative Care Center,named after Shahnaz's father late Haji Hussain Suleman is a reality.

True that this is a miniscule effort compared to the need of a city of 20 million people; however, the best part of this project is that personnel

will be trained in the care of the sick and terminal so that they can be hired by families to provide home hospice care. On the last visit we saw Pakistan American students volunteering and learning first hand about medical care in the limited circumstances.

The project would not have been possible without Dr. Sher Shah's dedicated team consisting of Dowites Dr. Shabbir Nawaz, Dr. Shoaib Sobani and others. His philanthropic deeds include but not limited to



Although the prevalence of blindness in Pakistan has come down from 1.78% in 1989-90 to 1.05% it is still a very high figure. Prevalence and the magnitude of blindness amounts to 1.5 million persons, with an incidence of 129,000 cases added each year. It has been estimated that there are 945,000 people who are blind in Punjab, 310,000 in Sindh, 18,000 in NWFP and 85,000 in Balochistan. Cataract still remains the leading cause of blindness worldwide, accounting for nearly half (47.8% or 17.7 million) of all blindness. The direct target group of the project is the population suffering mainly from Cataract, refractive errors and low vision in different suburban areas of Karachi. The total population of the target group is 20% of the City i.e about 3.6 million out of which 45% are children with 4-5% of refractive errors and 30% aged 40 and above with presbyopic changes and over all 0.56% with Cataract blind.

The main objective of the project is "to provide most accessible, high quality but low cost eye care services with special emphasis on cataract, refractive errors and low vision services to the unreached communities of Sub-Urban areas of Karachi.

Al-Rehman Medical Welfare Society is a non-profit registered organization which is established for achieving a larger scope and a greater volume of not only prevention of blindness activities but disability also, to make them educate to some standards. Among its aims are:

- Organising outreach programmes in underdeveloped areas of Karachi and other Parts of Sindh.
- Advocacy for initialising health and education programmes at national, district and Community level
- Public health education in the target area.

Last year, during 2015 more than 15000 patients were examined as outdoor patient at the centre out of which 847 patients were operated for cataract (435 of them were operated through Zakat).

The surgical procedure costs only Rs 5000 per patient that seems to be very cost effective as far as the outcome is concerned.

Dr. Mohsin Ansari joined charity work from 1994 at local level in Cleveland, Ohio. Became member of largest grass root organization of American Muslims (ICNA) in 1994. Served in the Board of Directors of ICNA Relief USA from 2002 till 2015. Was elected as the Chairman of ICNA Relief USA in 2008 and worked in that capacity for 7 years. Lead doctors' response from USA in Pakistan Earthquake, arranged more than 150 doctors to render services in Earthquake effected areas in Pakistan. Worked as a physician in a make shift Bagh, Azad Kashmir hospital in Pakistan after 2005 earthquake. Supervised the generation and then distribution of more than \$10 million US dollars during and immediately after earthquake 2005. Developed several temporary and permanent hospitals in Pakistan. Took part in Feed the hungry program under ICNA RELIF USA, which provided ongoing daily food to homeless and poverty stricken Americans. As a Chairman of ICNA Relief was instrumental in starting first Muslim Women Shelter Home in New York in 2006.

After 7 years of leadership of ICNA RELIEF, I was elected for an even bigger job of Chairman of HHRD (Helping Hand) USA. HHRD USA provide international Relief work in 21 countries. HHRD provides complete assistance to more than 15000 orphans, runs more than 2000 schools, runs several state of the art hospitals in Pakistan, including multimillion dollars project of artificial limbs in Mansehra, Pakistan. Invited as a speaker both nationally and internationally because of lifelong commitment to Charity work.

Acute Disaster relief Committee (DOGANA - ADRC). A DOGANA Initiative

Dear Fellow Dowites,

Pakistan has seen many natural and man-made disasters especially in past couple years. Earthquakes, floods, heat waves etc..These disasters have caused tremendous loss of innocent lives and inflicted sufferings on innocent people. Most of the sufferings are preventable if victims get help in timely manner. I am proud to say that DOGANA has always responded to these disasters. In 2015, after tragedy of heat wave and loss of lives in Karachi, Central Council of DOGANA felt the need to form a committee which can organize, coordinate and deliver the effective relief operation. Council has given me the responsibility to formulate this new committee. Followings are the structure and organization of this new committee.

NAME: DOGANA Acute Disaster Relief Committee (DOGANA - ADRC).

COMPOSITION:

The committee will comprise of 3 volunteer physicians who will be member in good standing of DOGANA, President DOGANA, Treasurer DOGANA, Ex Director. DOGANA and a member from Central Council of DOGANA

AIMS AND OBJECTIVES:

1. In case of major natural disasters, both in Pakistan or North America, the committee will timely raise, direct, coordinate, allocate funds to eligible response and recovery efforts as per policy and procedures and by-laws of DOGANA.

2. If needed, the committee may consider providing financial assistance to eligible disaster survivors.

3.DOGANA-ARDC will establish a 24 hours emergency phone number. The contact number will be available to DOGANA Central Council to initiate response in emergency situations

4. DOGANA ADRC may collaborate with other professional organizations to provide and coordinate relief efforts to disaster victims both domestic and in Pakistan

5. DOGANA ADRC will enter into memorandum of understanding (MOU) with authentically known relief organizations. Every MOU must be approved by Central Council of DOGANA.

FUNDS:

- 1. Funds will be managed by DOGANA Central Council
- 2. Funds will be allocated after approved by Central Council of DOGANA.
- 3. DOGANA ADRC will keep record of financial activities and share it with Treasurer of DOGANA
- 4. A system will be created where Auto-electronic confirmation of the receipts will be sent to the donors in a timely manner.

MEETINGS:

DOGANA ADRC will have its meeting at least every three months. Recorded minutes of the meeting will be sent to Secretary of DOGANA as soon as possible.

Dear Dowites,

It is my pleasure to announce DOGANA's Loan Program for deserving candidates who are applying for residency positions in US but are short of funds and need some financial support. There is an internal qualification assessment that has to be met to be eligible for this program.

The following is the criteria:

1-Should be a Dow graduate, should not have participated in self-funded scheme and should have applied on open merit seats.

2-There is an eight-point system for eligibility, and candidate should score five out of eight points.

3-Two points for scoring 90th percentile in Step I

4-Two points for scoring 90th percentile in Step II

5-One point for US clinical rotations

6-One point for Research paper/Publication

7-One point for Residency Offer/interview

8-One point for positive visa status, Green Card/H1 already in place/US citizen

9-The applicant should provide names of two Dow Graduates in US on the candidate's behalf regarding academic qualifications as well as help determine financial needs.


10-The maximum amount loaned will be 3000\$ per candidate. A candidate who fails to secure a residency spot one year, may apply a second year.

11-The money should be an interest free loan, expected to be returned within two years of starting residency.

In 2014 we helped three candidates through this program, two of those are already in residency positions and have started returning the loan. In 2015 we have helped eight candidates. We hope this program to be very successful as we are getting more funds from our fellow Dowites.

The Masood's Autosomal Dominant Gait Abnormality

I was back to my homeland. Ecstatic. Wanting to change things for the better; that's a story for another time.

I started working at Liaquat National Hosptial as a Neurologist. Dr. I H Bhatti was the Medical Director and a mentor.

My OPD started on Monday at 8AM and went till 12 Noon. After my OPD ended, Dr.Bhatti's OPD started in the same room that I was doing my OPD in, during the morning.

As I was about to be done, I got a "parchi" that I had to see a patient who was on a wheelchair. Shoot; I could see Bhatti sahib's grey hair from the top of the window that faced the hallway. "Man, he is out there waiting for me to leave his room", I was thinking and I had to see this patient that had been wheeled into the room with a "parchi" from a higher up of the hospital. "Oh well", I said. I will do the best I can and do a 2 min consultation. I a can do it. I had enough Neurology years under my belt. I had been trained by the best in Karachi, Dr. Akhter Ahmad, and then at the birthplace of Neurolgy, A B Baker's program, in the USA.

As she was wheeled close to me, I saw a middle aged lady, dressed in her black Burqa from head to heel and the vail covering her lower face; as is the custom we see every day and don't think anything about it. I asked her, "Why are you in a wheelchair"? She said, "I can't walk". "Why can't you walk", I asked? She said, "My legs are weak". "Are your hands OK", I asked? "Yes", she said. "OK, this is simple", I thought to myself. Next question was to inquire about bowel and bladder. She said that she can't make it to the bathroom and loses control of her bladder. "Bingo", I had it. "Normal arms, weak legs and loss of bladder control; it has to be the Lumbar spine". Now, all I had to do was to look at the reflexes. A hammer at the knees revealed not really brisk reflexes and Planters were not really very responsive. Time was passing by and by now Bhatti sahib had done a few laps of the hallway as I could see his head of grey hair moving up and down the hallway. All this took maybe a couple of minutes. Very focused questions and very focused exam and I had a diagnosis that she probably had a pathology at the Cauda Equina. Now all I needed to do was a MRI Lumbar spine. So, I ordered the MRI lumbar spine and walked out of the room to apologize to Dr. Bhatti about the delay. He was gracious but reserved. Conveyed to me with his mannerisms that he was OK with it this one time, but hope that I won't do it again. You can communicate all that without saying anything. Amazing this human body language.

Next day while rounding in the hospital, I was told that there was a new patient to be seen in one of the wards. As I entered the room, I saw the same lady I had seen the day before in the OPD on a wheel chair. She had had her MRI done and in order to see me, got herself admitted. Poor lady must have spent some money to do so as one couldn't just get admitted without depositing money at the hospital.

I looked at her MRI and to my surprise, it was normal. This had never happened to me before. A normal Scan when I had predicted an abnormality and actually localized it as well. I had residents with me too and I felt very "little". Where did I go wrong? How can I be wrong? It dawned on me as I was contemplating that the obvious thing that had gone wrong was that I had not stuck to the basics of Neurology. Basics of being a good physician. I did not take a good history. And it was all Bhatti sahib's fault. I was feeling guilty that I had made her spend so much money on the MRI. Anyways, I pulled up a chair and sat down beside her bed; something consultants never do in Pakistan. She was taken aback by my sitting at her bed side and wanting to talk to her and intently listening to what she had to say. Anyways, I asked the lady what the problem was? She again said, "I can't walk". This time, I was not falling for that "can't walk bit". I needed answers and there was no Bhatti sahib around either. I didn't let that answer slide by. I asked her to lift her legs off the bed

as I had seen her sit up in bed when I had come in and her legs hadn't looked weak to my "hawk eyes". She lifted them with ease. "They are not weak bibi", I exclaimed. "But I can't walk", she said. OK now, we need to get out of this circular question and answer session. So I asked her once again as to why can't she walk if her legs can move so well? She said, "They hurt"!!! Dhan Dhan Dhan Dhaaan (As the Pakistani movies' suspense music plays in my head). This changes the whole scenario. No weakness, rather pain; Hmmmm. "Where is the pain", was my next question? She pointed to her hips. "Both sides", I asked. "Both sides", she said. So, I made her sit and pushed on her hip joints; they were painful. I tested her proximal muscle strength; she was strong like an ox (well she can't be an ox, but you get my drift). I made her stand. Oh man, as she stood up, she was wobbly and walked with a waddling gait that was very painful. I had her sit down. I knew what it was. Mentally, I was kicking myself for getting her MRI and not getting her history properly in the OPD. But again, it was Bhatti sahib's fault. I told my resident to get her hips X-rayed and specifically ask them to look for Loosner's Zones and get her Calcium, Phosphorus and Acid Phos levels. I was sure that she had Osteomalacia. I made things move fast and within an hour we had the diagnosis. Her X-Rays showed microfractures around the neck of the femur with abnormally low Calcium and high Acid Phos. I started her on Calcium injections and Vitamin D. Saw her in follow up in a month and man was she a different lady. She walked in on her won two legs. Had she not been just a few years older than I was and the culture didn't prohibit it, she would have given me a "jhappy" (not an embrace, as embrace doesn't communicate what a "jhappy" does) and kissed me. I still felt bad about that MRI.

A few months passed. I then saw a lady in her late 20s or early 30s, who was brought in by her husband on a wheel chair. She too, was wearing a black burqa like the other lady and couldn't walk. This time, I had no Dr.Bhatti standing outside my room. A few questions, and Wa Laa, I knew that she had Osteomalacia. Went through the X-rays, Calcium, Phosphorus and Acid Phos. Similar results as the first one. Similar treatment and similar results. But this time, when she came back to see me, she told me that Seven of her cousins had the same problem as she did and they all wanted to come and consult me. Dhan Dhan Dhaan (again, that music). "What", I thought to myself. "Are they your real cousins", I asked? "Yes", she said, "They are my first cousins. My aunts' daughters" (Khala zaad behneiN). Again, Dhan Dhan Dhaa Dhaan Phaan!!! "Why don't you bring them so that I can see what the issue is", I told her. She promised to bring them soon. "Yeah sure", I had thought at that time. I had heard such promises many a times.

I was surprised that when I got to my clinic the next day, there were eight ladies sitting there waiting for me. One of them was my expatient. All clad in black burqas; head to toe with a veil across their lower face. I called them in one by one and got their history and examined them and they all, undoubtedly, had Osteomalacia. I called them all in together. My mind was racing. I could see a ground breaking article in the Green Journal of Neurology titled, "Masood's autosomal dominant Osteomalacia". I could see a Nobel Prize. I could see TV interviews. I could see a professorship. I got a detailed family history. There was nothing recessive or dominant about their affliction. I asked them where they lived? "Kharadar", they all said in unison. The lady, who had brought them, also lived in Kharadar. "Something wrong with Kharadar", I thought. "Where in Kharadar", I asked? "In the flats", one of them said. Then she tried to describe the geography of the place. They were six or seven storied, closely packed apartment buildings where their community lived. My final question was, "What floors do you live on"? No one lived higher than the second floor in a community where the flats were 6 or 7 stories tall where sunlight doesn't get to the ground; It's an urban Amazon!!! I may look dumb, but I am not that dumb. My autosomal dominant disease started to crumble. My dream of a Nobel Prize started to fade. I, once again, became a poor unknown neurologist, with no fame, no professorship, no TV interviews, no disease attributed to my good name and finally, no Nobel Prize.

I gave them the treatment and told them that next time they come, bring their hubbies along. I wanted to talk to them. But I knew, that the culture and the system we live in will not change and hence, this poorly recognized, avoidable and treatable condition will continue to flourish and ladies continue to suffer.

The point of this endless narration was that our part of the world doesn't recognize the fact that covering a woman, from head to toe in a black cloth, living in conditions where the sunrays don't penetrate and her staying home all day, makes her more prone to these avoidable and painful medical conditions that most of the time go unrecognized due to us turning a blind eye towards the issue. I can't imagine a God, who ordered his creations to adopt an unnatural life styles for His sake and then get sick as a result. This is a man made culture. Made by those men, who themselves have roving eyes and think that every other man has the same affliction and they have to hide their wives and daughters from those eyes; like their own.

I don't want to turn Mullah at the end of this narration, but just for the believers; In surah Noor, ayah 30 and 31; they both start with the sentence that both men and women, keep their eyes down. The way to cover oneself up follows later. But the main issue here is change in the mindset of males so that the females don't suffer.

I could have been famous. Sigh.
